2022 ANNUAL REPORT

2022 Operations Summary

Camp Lu Lay Lea was very excited to be back open during the Summer of 2022 after being closed during 2020 and 2021 due to Covid. We were able to hire approximately 50 staff over the summer to help fill 32 weekly staff positions. We were open to youth ages 8-14 for six different camp weeks and served a total of 333 youth campers. While at camp, youth are able to participate in devotions, chapel services, swimming, large group games, arts and crafts, and singing. Unfortunately, our last week of camp was cut short due to a Covid Outbreak. During October we were able to serve 16 youth and six chaperones for a Youth Group Weekend. During their stay, youth were able to join in chapel, canoeing, games, camp tour, volleyball and gaga ball.

New leadership was installed for the 2022 camp year. Amy Wojtowicz, a teacher in the Saginaw Public School system and the mother of four school age children became the camp director. She brought much needed experience in working with youth into the role. Her husband, Pastor Dan Wojtowicz, took on the role of pastoral advisor, working to ensure chapel services and devotions were appropriate for the campers.

Concerted efforts were made in 2022 to improve communications. The website was updated and the Facebook page was better managed. Additional fundraising efforts were put forth through social media, the website and a newsletter, which included a monetary ask and information about the upcoming Camp season and 75th-anniversary festivities. This newsletter also provided for the start of a mailing list to potential future donors and campers.

The Camp has operated under the Saginaw Valley Zone of the Lutheran Laymen' League for 74 years. In 2021, it was determined that the relationship should be changed and the camp become an independent entity. Good progress was made towards that goal in 2022. The Camp Lu Lay Lea, Inc. organization was formed, and during 2022, it was granted nonprofit status by the State of Michigan. Work has also started to attain federal nonprofit status.

Physical Properties Description

The Camp was purchased in 1948 from the Boy Scouts. It is located on Henderson Lake near Rose City, Michigan, and the waterfront provides swimming, boating and fishing opportunities. The Camp has hiking trails, a ball field and an archery range. Over the years, new buildings have been added and existing structures have been renovated. In 1978, a new bathhouse was built to replace the former bathhouse. A stand-alone pavilion was built in 2000 which serves as an outdoor activities center and gathering place for staff and campers. A new dining hall was constructed in 2010 with updated kitchen facilities, serving area and dining for up to 80 campers plus staff. At present the Camp consists of 18 buildings, including eight cabins for youth campers on 22 acres of land.

Forecast for 2023

Our #1 most important goal is to continue to bring the saving message of Jesus' death and resurrection to youth in the mid-Michigan area.

Target 360 campers and a corresponding positive cash flow

Plan to have a 75 Years of Camp Lu Lay Lea celebration June 24, 2023 Expect the zone to hand the camp over to the new Camp Lu Lay Lea, Inc. and for that organization to hold its first annual members meeting



Mission

Operate and maintain a Christian youth camp, espousing Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod (LCMS) beliefs, for youth, especially LCMS youth, in the Saginaw Valley and Southeast Michigan regions.

Purpose

Provide a meaningful Christian camp experience in exceptional natural settings where youth get away from their daily routines to grow in relationship, spiritual depth, and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

2022 Financial Statement Summary

The Camp's closure in 2020 and 2021 due to the COVID pandemic negatively impacted the Camp's finances as limited revenue was available to offset ongoing expenses. The Camp's cash reserves declined from over \$127,000 at the beginning of 2020 to \$56,000 at the end of 2021. The Camp re-opened in 2022, however a COVID outbreak the last week of the season caused the Camp to close and refund registration fees. In addition, the camp facilities were improperly winterized in 2021, resulting in over \$18,000 of unplanned plumbing expenses to repair damaged pipes and equipment in 2022. Despite these challenges, strong donor support helped stabilize the Camp's finances with donations totaling over \$54,000. Cash balances were \$52,690 at December 31, 2022. The 2023 camp season has begun on a brighter note as camper registrations are well ahead of the 2022 season's pace and cash balances are increasing.
